#### About this course

This is an online, asynchronous course exploring the design of and motivation for invented languages from a modern linguistic point of view. Invented languages are those that are the result of some conscious and deliberate design rather than ones occurring naturally. We will explore the different motivations for language invention, from the desire to create a "perfect language", to fictional world-building, to fostering global harmony.

In characterizing the different types of invented languages, students will develop familiarity with the basic tools of linguistic theory, focusing on phonology, morphology, syntax, and semantics. Languages analyzed in detail include Klingon, Esperanto, Lojban, Valyrian, Elvish, and various philosophical languages.

## Course learning goals

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Explore and evaluate motivations for inventing new languages
- Compare invented languages to natural human languages
- Characterize and analyze the types of existing invented languages
- Become familiar with the fundamental tools of modern linguistic theory

## Reading quizzes

Each week, you must take a short quiz based on the readings and lesson materials. The quizzes are in the Quizzes module of Canvas. Unless otherwise indicated, you can only submit the quiz **once**. Once you start, you will have 90 minutes to complete the quiz.

Quizzes must be completed on Canvas by the due date and time. Late submissions, by the end of Saturday (24 hours after their due date), will lead to a 50% decrease in your quiz grade. Late submissions after the end of Saturday will **not be accepted**. Your lowest-scoring quiz grade will be dropped. **Please do not collaborate on any quizzes** (see more in the Academic Integrity section).

## Group discussions

To recreate the type of learning environment present in a physical classroom, you are required to participate in the online discussion board (the Discussion module of Canvas).

The class will be split into 2 discussion groups. You are expected to make one initial post by Thursday 11:59pm following the discussion prompts, and make at least one reply to other members' posts by Friday 11:59pm. The discussion thread will be visible to your group members and the instructor.

Each of your post is worth 5 points max:

- 1 point for submitting both initial post and reply on time;
- 2 points: in your initial post, you follow the requirements in each discussion prompt;
- 2 points: in your reply to others' posts, you give helpful and meaningful replies to help your peers develop their ideas.

Discussions must be completed on Canvas by the due date and time. Late submissions, within 24 hours after their due date), will lead to a 50% decrease in your discussion grade. Late submissions after 24 hours will **not be accepted**. **Please do not copy others' answers** (see more in the Academic Integrity section).

## Midterm project

The midterm project is worth 15% of the course grade. The assignment is designed to let you use the tools and information learned in class in a creative way. The assignment is in the Assignments module on Canvas. The assignment is available since the first day of the course and the submission is open a week before the indicated due date. The assignment must be submitted as a PDF document.

# Final project

The final project is worth 25% of the course grade. You are required to present your work to the classmates. The final project is designed to let you use the tools and information learned in class in a creative way. It is a continuation of the midterm project.
